ENVIRONMENTAL STEERING COMMITTEE

IF WE ALL DO A LITTLE, WE CAN MAKE A BIG DIFFERENCE

Palmer Township's Environmental Steering Committee invites your whole family to join us Saturday April 20th for an Earth Day celebration including a series of activities that could increase the magic of nature throughout our township, one property at a time.



Palmer Township is a community of many lawns, often connected for blocks. We can enhance our individual yards' environmental benefits by working together to create an interconnected network of habitat, as well as reduce stormwater runoff, and make a huge impact to our local environment.

EARTH DAY EVENTS

- Mitigate Your Stormwater: Demonstration and Discussion of Residential Stormwater Interventions including rain gardens and meadows discussion, and a rain barrel set-up and management demonstration.
- **Go Native with PA Native Plant Sale**: Native plants are known to reduce the need to water lawns. They grow deeper roots, slowing the flow of water across properties.

The Penn State Lehigh/Northampton County Master Gardeners has agreed to hold a plant sale in partnership with our other activities. This sale will include a variety of plants that are suitable for our area and have the most benefit for attracting pollinators to your garden. Options will be available for all growing conditions: shade, sun, moist, dry. Master Gardeners will be available to assist you in making the best selections for your garden along with being able to answer any other gardening-related questions.

- **Pre-registration for rain-barrel-building event on June 2.** This is a partnership with the Bushkill Stream Conservancy. More information will be available at the event.
- **Planet vs. Plastics:** In honor of this Global Earth Day's official theme we are inviting related businesses, speakers, and demonstrations for plastic reduction.

MS4 - PUBLIC WORKS SITE BMPS- INFILTRATION BASINS

Palmer Township utilizes many different Best Management Practices, or BMPs, in locations and sites across the Township. You have learned about the Charles Chrin Community Center Site in another article, as well as wash bays at the Public Works building and the ecological filter at Mill Race Park. The BMP of focus for this article are the three infiltration basins at the Public Works/Public Utilities (PW/PU) site.

These infiltration basins are important to the MS4 program and stormwater management system because the design of the basin allows water from the PW/PU site to be filtered naturally through the soil and ultimately recharge the groundwater supply. This plays a huge role in reducing the amount of pollution discharged from the stormwater system into our creeks and rivers. There are other functions of the infiltration basins that also benefit the stormwater system of Palmer.

One of the other functions that helps maintain a healthy ecosystem is the permanent rip-rap outlet protection at three discharge pipes from the infiltration basins. Large rocks act as outlet protection as well as energy dissipators to reduce flow velocity and prevent any erosion or scouring caused by water flowing out of the basins. One of the main goals is to prevent any erosion of embankments or berms to ensure that the infiltration basins work properly for as long as possible to improve water quality and safety. These infiltration basins also have water quality inlets and manholes in strategic locations across the site to allow debris in water, like sand or silt, to settle out of the flow and give township employees access to remove any floating debris or sediment that may have found its way into the stormwater system.

Lastly, one of the safety features of the infiltration basins that most basins are required to have are emergency spillways. If you recall the ecological filter article, the spillway at Mill Race was rock lined to

filter water before reaching Bushkill Creek. While these emergency spillways for the infiltration basins are not lined with a layer of rock, they still have an important function. If there is ever too much water for the infiltration basins to collect, water would flow out of the emergency spillway before flowing anywhere else and causing bank erosion. This allows Palmer Township to somewhat control where the stormwater ends up ensuring not only employee safety at the PW/PU site but also ensuring resident safety. To keep any unwanted animals or visitors out of the basins, there is a fence around the perimeter of the three basins with a gate. 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CURBSIDE RECYCLING

All carts should be placed curbside by 5:00am. Materials placed outside of the carts will not be collected. Lids need to be closed and not overflowing to prevent litter and cart lid breakage.



PAPER – office and school paper, newsprint, junk mail, paper bags, phone books, magazines, catalogs, envelopes, wrapping paper (no metallic paper or bows.) Shredded paper should be bagged and placed in the trash cart.

CARDBOARD – paper towel rolls, cereal, cracker, and pasta boxes, shipping and shoe boxes, manila folders, etc. No wax-coated, pizza or other food, paint or oil contaminated boxes. Flatten and/or cut up to release from the cart easily.

PLASTIC BOTTLES OR CONTAINERS – Rinsed household tubs and bottles (such as soda, water, milk, juice, shampoo, detergent, condiments, yogurt, margarine, to-go containers, pet food, etc.) No plastic bags or Styrofoam. Look for the recycling triangle on the bottom with these numbers inside #1, #2, #3, #4, #5, #6, #7. Lids attached.

FLEXIBLE (NOT RIGID) PLASTICS – these are <u>able to flex or wrap and are rinsed clean of food contamination</u>. Acceptable items include plastic shopping bags, potato chip and snack bags, produce bags including salad and carrot bags, shredded cheese packages, pet treat pouches, case wrap, shrink film, bread bags, bubble wrap, cereal bags, drink pouches, paper towel and toilet paper overwraps, detergent pouches, shipping bags.

GLASS - Rinsed clear, brown, and green bottles and jars. Discard lids.

CANS – Rinsed aluminum, bi-metal, and tin cans as well as empty aerosol cans.

METAL POTS AND PANS

CARTONS – Rinsed food cartons that contain milk, juice, broth, cream, egg substitutes, soup, soy milk, and wine boxes.

No food contaminated items, electronics, textiles, construction debris, or yard waste.

2024 HOLIDAY COLLECTIONS

Waste and recycling collections will be delayed by one day following these holidays: Memorial Day, 4th of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas.

CURBSIDE TRASH

- All trash goes into your green cart with the green lid. Materials outside the cart will not be collected.
- Trash should be bagged before being placed in the cart. Bagging helps keep your cart clean and reduces windblown litter.
- <u>Prohibited items include recyclables</u> (see left), tires, hazardous waste, liquid paint, motor oil, electronics, yard waste, construction debris (wood, concrete, window panes, etc.), dirt, rock, and car parts.
- Overfilled carts or carts containing prohibited items will not be collected.

RECYCLING DROP-OFF LOCATIONS

Accepts paper, cardboard, plastic bottles and containers, glass, cans, scrap metals, and yard waste (no more than 3 small bundles of yard waste (no larger than 3' x 3' and not exceeding 40 lbs.) per visit. Free to Palmer residents and businesses

Berks Street Yard Waste Composting Center

March First Sunday of the Month, 12:00pm to 4:00pm, April-November Saturday 10:00am-4:00pm, Sunday 12:00pm-4:00pm and Wednesdays 9:00am-3:00pm.

Accepts large amounts of yard waste for a small fee. NO plastic rope, bags, or twine; grass clippings, tree stumps, soil or dirt, sod, wood, animal excrement, or noxious weeds including bamboo of any kind. Tree limbs must be less than 12" inches in diameter.

Speed limit within the center is 5 MPH at all times.

UPCOMING SPECIAL CURBSIDE COLLECTIONS

Place curbside on your scheduled collection day, but will be collected that week by a separate vehicle.

BULK ITEM COLLECTION: Weeks of March 4, May 13, September 9, and November 18

One item per collection. Bulk items are defined as items too large to fit into the trash cart; with the general rule of thumb being an item the approximate dimensions and weight of a standard size sofa, and that can be carried by two (2) men. Acceptable items include plastic dishwashers, furniture, mattresses and box springs (wrapped in plastic), rugs rolled up and tied and no larger than 3' x 6'. Unacceptable items include, but are not limited to, electronics, construction debris (i.e. wood, sinks, toilets, doors, windows, siding, roofing shingles, etc.), large glass items (i.e. glass tables, china cabinets, or window panes), hazardous materials, tires, yard waste, grass clippings, or additional household trash. If you can't wait for a bulk item collection, you may request a special bulk item collection by contacting Waste Management Customer Service at 800.621.2100. Identify yourself as a resident of Palmer Township, PA to receive the Township's \$40 per item pickup price. Be sure to get the confirmation number in the event follow-up is needed.

METAL AND APPLIANCES COLLECTION: WEEKS OF APRIL 15 AND SEPTEMBER 23

One item that can be carried by two (2) men per collection. Appliances such as microwaves, air conditioners, dehumidifiers, refrigerators and freezers (remove doors; FREON does not need to be removed); washers, dryers, metal dishwashers, steel or aluminum tire rims (w/o tires), hot water heaters, metal swing sets (taken apart and tied up), bicycles, BBQ grills (gas, propane, and/or charcoal removed), and push-behind lawnmowers (oil and gas removed). No electronics or plastic dishwashers. Metal items and appliances, as described here, can be taken to the Palmer Township Recycling Center, 3600 Hartley Avenue, year-round.

YARD WASTE COLLECTION: Weeks of June 3 and November 4

Unlimited amounts of yard waste (leaves, branches, twigs, flowers, roots, bushes, garden clippings) will be collected curbside. You must place your yard waste at the curb in one of the following ways or it will NOT be collected -

- · Place your yard waste in any clean, open-top container (NOT YOUR AUTOMATED CART).
- Tie your yard waste with cotton or hemp twine in bundles no larger than 3' x 3' x 3', weighing no more than 40 lbs. (NO PLASTIC ROPE OR TWINE).
- Place your yard waste in compostable paper bags (NO PLASTIC BAGS).
- No grass clippings, tree stumps loose soils, sod, wood, or tree limbs over four inches in diameter; human or animal excrement; noxious weeds or soil contaminated with hazardous substances.

LEAF COLLECTION: Eight weeks in the Fall (*typically mid-October to second week of December*) Residents must rake their leaves into the street and close to the curb. This collection is highly dependent on weather conditions.

CHRISTMAS TREE COLLECTION - First three (3) full weeks in January

Remove any transport bags, tinsel, ornaments, lights, and tree stands. Trees in plastic bags will not be collected.

PALMER TOWNSHIP STORMWATER AUTHORITY

In 2022 and 2023, following increased federal and state regulations, Palmer Township had to step back and re-evaluate its stormwater approach and municipal separate storm sewer (MS4) program. After hiring a new stormwater engineer, Herbert, Rowland, and Grubic Inc. (HRG), Palmer Township began to take necessary steps for a stormwater overhaul. Over the course of four months, Palmer Township held stakeholder meetings to discuss, educate, and receive feedback on a utility fee that would collect the funds needed for the improvements to the stormwater infrastructure and the MS4 program. Shortly after the conclusion of the stakeholder stormwater meetings, there were catastrophic storms in July that caused damage to Township infrastructure and near residential homes. In September, two public meetings were held to educate residents about implementing a stormwater utility fee, the MS4 program, and Township stormwater budget needs. Flyers with fee information, MS4 program requirements, and meeting dates and times were mailed to Palmer residents.

To prepare for increased storms and unpredictable conditions, Palmer Township formed the Palmer Township Stormwater Authority (PTSA) to govern the administration, management, and operation of the stormwater system. The PTSA was incorporated in September 2023, and consists of five members who have staggered terms. Authority members meet every third Wednesday of the month at 5PM to discuss stormwater projects and infrastructure updates to the stormwater system. PTSA is also involved in the MS4 program through funding and implementing Pollutant Reduction Plan projects that are required to be completed by the end of Palmer's MS4 permit in 2028.

Following the establishment of the Authority, the PTSA approved documents to govern the relationship between the Authority and the Township's Board of Supervisors, and a fee structure that averages \$20 per month for residential households. The fee structure is divided into four tiers based on the amount of impervious surface on each parcel of land. Impervious surface is material that does not



allow water to permeate the ground including, but not limited to asphalt, concrete, roofs, and patios. Collection of this fee will be deposited into a separate stormwater fund that will be used solely for stormwater management and MS4 program requirements. Some examples of what funds will be used for are updating stormwater infrastructure, retrofitting detention basins for water quality, purchasing, and maintaining equipment for stormwater, and performing maintenance on Township owned stormwater facilities.

This stormwater utility fee will positively impact the stormwater program and infrastructure within the Township, but some may be wondering how they could reduce their fee. PTSA members also recently approved a Credit and Appeals Manual that explains how to apply for a credit to reduce your stormwater fee, what constitutes a credit, and the percentage of different credits that can reduce your fee.



FEES:

- **PENN PUMP:** There are 2 permits available per day at Penn Pump Park. Penn Pump permits allow the consumption of alcohol and access to restrooms. Rental time 8:00am–10:00pm
 - 1. <u>Penn Pump Pavilion Permit</u>*Not to exceed 150 people. Allows parking near the pavilion and pavilion access. **Residents \$100.00**
 - 2. Penn Pump Picnic Permit *Not to exceed 50 people, required for 10 or more people. Picnic permit for Penn Pump allows access to tables outside of the pavilion.

 Residents \$50.00
- **RIVERVIEW**: Permit for Riverview Park allows the responsible use of alcohol. Rental time 8:00am-10:00pm. **Residents \$100.00 & Non-Residents \$175.00**
- **BIP PAVILION, BRIARCLIFFE, FAIRVIEW, KEYSTONE, & MILL RACE** Alcohol prohibited. Rental time 8:00am-10:00pm

Did you know you can save money on your property taxes through the Homestead/Farmstead Exclusion? The Taxpayer Relief Act reduces your property tax bill on your primary residence and the savings are deducted automatically.

Applying is simple and once you've signed up, you don't have to worry about it again as long as you live in your home! Under the program, individuals qualify for a homestead exclusion so long as they own the property for which they are applying, they pay the taxes on it and it is their primary residence.

Please call my offices at 484-544-0146 or 610-746-5090 so my staff can either confirm you've already signed up for the program or help guide you through the application process and submit it on your behalf. You may also visit my district office at 134 South Main St., Nazareth, or my Palmer district office at 301 Village at Stones Crossing Road if you prefer in-person assistance.

Applicants will be notified within 30 days if they qualify for a reduction in their real estate taxes. Please do not hesitate to reach out to my district office for assistance. I look forward to serving you.

During calendar year 2023 the Earth Stewards of Palmer Township achieved a milestone in their efforts to keep Palmer Township a

You ask, "What was the milestone?" This small group of volunteers collected 5,151 pounds of litter, 874 pounds of recyclables, 115 pounds of metal, 59 tires for a grand total of 6,140 pounds (3 tons) of materials removed from your township trails and roadways.








TREE CITY USA



PLANNING

In 2024, let's all celebrate the walking and bicycling trails of Palmer Township. If you didn't already know, our Township is home to four really important trail segments, and they all connect. The first one, the Palmer Bikeway is the name we gave to one of this country's first ever Rails to Trails pathways. Rails to Trails is a program created by the Railroad Revitalization and Regulatory Reform Act and it immediately preserved important and scenic rail corridors through the establishment of public trails. Our bikeway uses a Rails to Trails corridor and delivers trail users through major portions of our township, through the woods and along the creek. The second trail segment we're lucky to have is part of the 165-mile-long Delaware & Lehigh National Heritage Corridor.



This corridor stretches from the City of Scranton, and Wilkes Barre, all the way to Bristol Borough, Bucks County. During the Industrial Revolution, anthracite coal was once delivered using a system of canals and towpaths walked on by mules pulling their coal barges.



Today walking and bicycling paths have replaced the tow paths. The third trail we celebrate is the Two-Rivers Trail System. Through Palmer Township, nearly 8 miles of trail path helps to honor the history and legacy of the communities along the Delaware and Lehigh rivers, and all the special streams that contribute to them. Some of the Lehigh Valley's most scenic farmland, woods, and streams are found in Northampton County. Our trail enjoys as much of the scenery as it can. The fourth trail segment we celebrate is possibly the most special, and that is the September 11th National Memorial Trail. The '9/11 Trail' includes nearly 1,300 miles of trails, both new and hosted by others, that now serve as a

pilgrimage trail. A pilgrimage trail helps trail users experience an area or a region's history in a more dynamic way. Special scenery and destinations are called out to help make the trail truly unique. For the 9/11 Trail, three sites are identified as major trail destinations and they include the site of the Flight 93 National Memorial, the Pentagon Memorial, and the National September 11th Memorial and Museum. Our portion of the 9/11 Trail helps trail users travel from New York City toward the Flight 93 Memorial in Central PA. We are honored to host the 9/11 Trail and blessed to have so many great trail segments of such regional acclaim. In 2024, Palmer Township will be working on planning and design and construction projects to improve portions of all of these trails. It will be a really remarkable year.

Palmer Township is looking for individuals to fill vacant seats on the Building Code Board of Appeals. The Board of Appeals hears and rules on appeals, requests for variances and extensions of time for the Pennsylvania Uniform Construction Code. Appeals are based on a claim that the true intent of the act or Uniform Construction Code has been incorrectly interpreted, the provisions of the act or Uniform Construction Code do not fully apply or an equivalent form of construction is to be used. Hearings are held on an as-needed basis.

Individuals shall be qualified by training and experience to pass on matters pertaining to building construction. Training and experience may consist of licensure as an architect or engineer, experience in the construction industry, and training or experience as an inspector or plan reviewer. KEEPING YOUR PIPES CLEAR

You've all heard that April showers bring May flowers. But what about, "Flushing those wipes will clog up your pipes!" Or the old ditty, "Water down your drain will cease, if you don't keep out the fats, oils, and grease!"

Silly, we know, but keeping your sewer pipes free and clear of fats, oils, and grease (FOG) is critical to the health of your pipes and our environment. When pipes get clogged with FOG, it causes messy backups in our homes, and sanitary sewer overflows into our streets and waterways. This ultimately creates health concerns for people and animals with the free-flowing waste polluting our surroundings. Caring for your sewer pipes isn't something you think about, but it positively impacts our lives and wallets.

What are the warning signs of clogged sewer pipes?

- Slower draining in your sinks and tubs
- Gurgling noises while the water is draining
- Unpleasant odors, like rotten egg smells
- Eventually, water backup in drains

What can you do to keep your pipes clean? It's pretty simple! Just follow these tips to avoid costly clogs.

• Use strainers in your sinks; don't push food waste, grease, or hair down the drain.

- Before washing dishes, remove residual food waste and put it into the garbage or compost pile.
- Only use garbage disposal for small amounts of scraps.
- Don't flush wipes or paper towels down the drain. Those "Flushable Wipes" do not decompose and can clog drains, especially when mixed with FOG.
- Use one-ply toilet paper.
- Do not flush feminine hygiene products down the drain.
- Be cautious installing low-flow toilets; be sure they can fully flush waste out of your system.
- Avoid planting trees or bushes near your sewer line to prevent root intrusion.
- Avoid harsh chemicals to keep pipes clean.
- Thoroughly flush your drains periodically. Fill up your sink or tub with water, allow it to drain, and check that it drains freely. This can flush out small residual buildups in your system.

Address the warning signs as soon as they arise, and don't wait until it's too late. Changing your disposal habits is the best remedy to avoid clogged pipes.


